



Synopsis

Setting: Vienna, Austria around 1874.

Act 1: The operetta opens with a lavish party hosted by the wealthy Gabriel von Eisenstein, who is bidding farewell to his friend Dr. Falke. Unbeknownst to Eisenstein, Falke seeks revenge for a past prank by orchestrating a series of events designed to embarrass him. Eisenstein is convinced by his friend, the prison governor Frank, to delay his imminent jail sentence by attending Prince Orlofsky's extravagant ball. Meanwhile, Eisenstein's wife, Rosalinde, receives a visit from her former lover, Alfred, who serenades her. Mistaking him for her husband, she flirts with him before revealing her true identity.

Act 2: At Prince Orlofsky's ball, the guests indulge in revelry and disguises. Eisenstein, under the guise of a French nobleman, encounters his wife, Rosalinde, who is disguised as a Hungarian countess. They flirt with each other, unaware of their true identities. Dr. Falke further complicates matters by introducing Eisenstein to Rosalinde, claiming to be an old friend. The confusion escalates as the characters engage in playful banter and champagne-fueled antics.

Act 3: Back at Eisenstein's home, the consequences of the night's events unfold. Alfred, who was mistaken for Eisenstein at the ball, is arrested in his place and taken to jail. Eisenstein arrives at the prison to serve his sentence but is surprised to find Alfred already imprisoned. Dr. Falke reveals his elaborate scheme to Eisenstein, who sees the humor in the situation. Rosalinde arrives, and the misunderstandings are resolved as the characters forgive each other and embrace. The operetta concludes with a joyous ensemble celebrating love, forgiveness, and the absurdities of life.

Sinopsis en Español

Ambientación: Viena, Austria, alrededor de 1874.

Acto 1: La opereta comienza con una lujosa fiesta organizada por el adinerado Gabriel von Eisenstein, quien se despide de su amigo, el Dr. Falke. Sin que Eisenstein lo sepa, Falke planea vengarse de una broma pasada orquestando una serie de eventos diseñados para avergonzarlo. Eisenstein es convencido por su amigo, el gobernador de la prisión, Frank, de posponer su inminente sentencia de cárcel para asistir al extravagante baile del Príncipe Orlofsky. Mientras tanto, la esposa de Eisenstein, Rosalinde, recibe la visita de su antiguo amante, Alfred, quien la serenatea. Confundiéndolo con su esposo, coquetea con él antes de revelar su verdadera identidad

Acto 2: En el baile del Príncipe Orlofsky, los invitados se entregan al desenfreno y los disfraces. Eisenstein, disfrazado de noble francés, se encuentra con su esposa, Rosalinde, quien está disfrazada de condesa húngara. Coquetean sin saber quiénes son realmente. El Dr. Falke complica aún más las cosas al presentar a Eisenstein con Rosalinde, afirmando ser un viejo amigo. La confusión aumenta mientras los personajes se sumergen en conversaciones juguetonas y travesuras alimentadas por el champán.

Acto 3: De regreso en la casa de Eisenstein, se revelan las consecuencias de los eventos de la noche. Alfred, quien fue confundido con Eisenstein en el baile, es arrestado en su lugar y llevado a la cárcel. Eisenstein llega a la prisión para cumplir su sentencia, pero se sorprende al encontrar a Alfred ya encarcelado. El Dr. Falke revela su elaborado plan a Eisenstein, quien ve el humor en la situación. Rosalinde llega y los malentendidos se resuelven mientras los personajes se perdonan y se abrazan. La opereta concluye con un alegre ensamble que celebra el amor, el perdón y las absurdidades de la vida.

Eisenstein: David Sauer



Tenor, **David Sauer**, praised by The New York Times for his "handsome and impressive" voice, has performed internationally and across the U.S. in roles such as Rodolfo (*La Bohème*), Alfredo (*La Traviata*), and Pollione (*Norma*). His credits include Utah Festival Opera, Lyrical Opera Theater, Utah Opera, and the Montefeltro Festival (Italy), among others. A former General Director of St. George Opera and voice faculty at Southern Utah University, he directed operatic productions and was a Rocky Mountain Region finalist and Utah District winner in the 2014 Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions.

Eisenstein: Christopher Stockslager



Somehow, in the course of a year, **Chris** has sung bass, baritone, and tenor roles! Dramatic coloratura soprano next, maybe?;) He graduated with his BA in Classical Voice from Westminster College in 2015. In 2017, he earned his MM also in Classical Voice from The Manhattan School of Music, under Metropolitan Opera legend James Morris. Upcoming roles include Ford in *Falstaff*, also with LOT. Previous role highlights include Escamillo in *Carmen*, Don Basilio in *Il Barbiere di Siviglia*, Schaunard in *La Bohème*, Lord Savage in *Jekyll & Hyde*, Peter in *Company*, and various operatic, musical theatre, and jazz gigs in Utah & New York City.

her family, friends and husband who encourage her daily to pursue her dreams. She is also very grateful to Lynnette Owens who continues to push her outside her comfort zone.




Frank: Rod Hansen
